Until it was rediscovered and the city treated as a UNESCO site where it being taken care of, Timbuktu was a place of mystery.





### Grammar and Spelling Corner

### Spelling Rule for the Suffixes -ing or -ed in Words that End With a "Y"

\*When you need to add –ing to a word (usually a verb) that ends with a "y," just add the –ing ending.

Examples: try = trying

apply = applying

\*When you need to add –ed to a word (usually a verb) that ends with a "y" that comes after a vowel (a/e/i/o/u), just add the –ed ending!

Examples: play = played

enjoy = enjoyed

When you need to add –ed to a word (usually a verb) that ends with a "y" that comes after a consonant (all the other letters), change the "y" to an "i" and add the –ed ending!

Examples: cry = cried

bury = buried

#### Educational Resources

Interested in doing an apprenticeship program or going to college or university?

It can be helpful to have your high school diploma. Here are some ways to obtain your high school diploma in Ontario.

- Go to an adult high school to obtain your diploma; or
- Check if you are eligible to take the ACE Certificate Program. This program helps you do courses that are equivalent to high school courses and necessary to enter certain college or university programs; or
- Take the GED test. This is a test that gives you a certificate equivalent to a high school diploma. To obtain this certificate, you need to take five tests; or
- Enter college as a mature student if you are 19 years of age or older. You will probably need to do one or more tests to be admitted.

### Fall Recipe

#### **Pumpkin Gingerbread Loaf**

Prep: 15 min.
Cook: 45 min.
Total: 60 min.
Servings: 24

**Yield:** 2 - 9x5 inch loaves

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 3 cups sugar
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 2/3 cup water
- 1 can pumpkin puree (15 ounces)
- 2 tsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp ground allspice
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp ground cloves
- 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp baking soda
- 1 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp baking powder

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 350°F (175°C). Lightly grease two 9x5 inch loaf pans.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, combine sugar, oil, and eggs, and beat until smooth. Add water and beat until well-blended. Stir in pumpkin, ginger, allspice, cinnamon, and cloves.
- 3. In a medium bowl, combine flour, soda, salt, and baking powder.
- 4. Add dry ingredients to pumpkin mixture and blend just until all ingredients are mixed. Divide the batter between prepared pans.
- 5. Bake in preheated oven until toothpick comes out clean, about 1 hour.





### Idioms with the Word Fall - Difficult

Idioms are phrases that do not mean what the words say. For example, when we say, "It's raining cats and dogs," it's not really raining cats and dogs. It means it's raining a lot!" Read the following idioms that have the word *fall* in them and try to use them in sentences of your own.

(a) fall into the wrong hands: when information or an object is stolen or found by a bad or dangerous person.

E.g. If the private information <u>falls into the wrong hands</u>, it would cause many problems for the security of people's social insurance numbers.

- (b) fall into someone's lap: when someone gets something he/she wants without doing anything
- E.g. The job just <u>fell into her lap!</u> Her friend knew that she was looking for work and talked to her manager, who quickly agreed to meet her for an interview.
- (c) fall between/through the cracks: when someone is accidentally overlooked, ignored, or forgotten
- E.g. Many students <u>fall through the cracks</u> in the school system because classes are too big and some students can't get enough attention and help for learning challenges.
- (d) fall into place: when things start to make sense or start to happen in a way that is easy and without any problems
- E.g. After she finally made the decision to go back to school, things started to <u>fall into place</u>. She found a program that gives grants for people to go to college and she was approved!
- (e) fall into line: when someone starts to follow the rules and behave according to expectations
- E.g. After about one month of being at the military academy, the young man <u>fell into line</u> and stopped his rebellious behaviour.
- **(f) fall head over heels in love:** when someone feels deep, sudden and absolute love for someone else
- E.g. When the man saw how kind and generous the woman was, he <u>fell head over heels in love</u> with her.
